Near
Something close-by.
Far
Something that is not close.

Beach
Land next to the sea which is usually pebbly or sandy.

Cliff
A steep wall of rock.

Coast
The area where sea and land meet.

Forest
A place where there are mostly trees.

Hill
A piece of land that rises higher than everything around it.

Mountain
Is higher and steeper than a hill.

Ocean
A huge amount of saltwater.
Sea
Is smaller than an ocean and made up of saltwater.

River
The path that water takes as it flows over land, made of freshwater.

Valley
A long, low area of land, often between mountains and hills.

Vegetation
The plant life of an area.

Port
A place where boats can go to load and unload their supplies.

Harbour
A safe place for ships and boats to stay.
