Phonics at WHPS

Welcome to the Phonics edition of WHPS weekly. This week we are zooming in on how phonics and early reading are taught at West Hampstead.

Read on to find out more about how we teach reading and why it is so important.



As a school, our aim is to unlock the fun, joy and learning that comes with reading.

Our curriculum is designed to enable the children to progress as quickly as possible from learning to read to reading to learn.

On the journey to becoming a successful reader, there are five essential components that the children need to develop.




Strong Phonological Awareness predicts reading success.

We begin work on this in Nursery by providing activities that develop phonological skills. These include:

- Detecting **rhyme** e.g. through sounds and nursery rhymes
- Detecting syllables in words by clapping them
- Identifying initial letter sounds by orally blending and segmenting words e.g. "Can you h-o-p?"



e.g. at mealtimes, you could play... "I spy something on my plate beginning with...p" (saying the letter sound not its name)



Phonological Awareness

continues to be crucial as the children enter reception and they need to tackle more complex words.









Phonics involves teaching which letters represent the sounds that make a word.

Once children know these individual phonemes they are able to blend them to read and spell.

At West Hampstead, we follow the *Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised* as our Systematic, Synthetic Phonics (SSP) programme to teach phonics, early reading and spelling.

From Reception to the first term in Year 2, the children receive daily phonics lessons which are fun, engaging, interactive and are designed to build over time.









A key element of the sessions is constant revisiting of previously taught sounds and skills so that learning is embedded in the long-term memory and can be applied instantly when reading and writing.

Practice makes permanent!

This is why daily home reading is <u>so</u> important.

You can support at home by providing lots of practise for the children to develop quick recall of all taught sounds and to practise blending and spelling using the new sounds in their homework.

Fluency is the ability to <u>read accurately, at an appropriate pace and with attention to expression</u>. This impacts directly on comprehension.

If children are struggling to sound out words, reading can become exhausting, children can lose motivation and find it harder to comprehend what they are reading.

This is why phonic decoding needs to become automatic and children still need plenty of opportunities to practise reading aloud as they get older and to hear others reading aloud with appropriate phrasing and expression.

At school, children in the younger years read the same book three times a week:

- Session 1—Focus on decoding
- Session 2—Using expression
- Session 3—The children are more fluent and able to discuss comprehension questions



Adults from all around the school support with small group reading provision.

This ensures that we can target each child's reading level and every child is heard reading every day.

Higher up the school, children have daily whole class reading sessions which includes opportunities to read aloud and to learn more about phrasing and using expression.

You can support at home by encouraging your child to read their early reader books several times to develop fluency *and* by sharing picture storybooks so that they hear fluent reading modelled.

It is generally found that parents tend to read less often to their children as they go through KS2 but older children still benefit hugely from hearing you read to them.

You could take turns to read sections of their home reader books.



Developing a strong **vocabulary** enables children to think and understand more deeply - the more they understand word meanings, the deeper their comprehension.

Vocabulary development comes from:

- Having quality conversation with others from birth
- Exposure to rich and interesting texts
- Opportunities to discuss the texts they are reading



At school, the children are exposed to new words daily across all areas of the curriculum with lots of opportunities to revisit and use them.

Comprehension is the ultimate goal and the sum of good **phonological awareness**, automaticity in **phonics**, reading **fluency** and a strong **vocabulary**. If we can extract meaning from a text and think critically about it, then we comprehend.

Learning to read —> accessing the curriculum —> reading to learn

We are excited at West Hampstead to be going on the journey to reading with your children.

It is important to us that parents are on board with the journey too!
